Marine litter is both a local and global issue that is gaining increasing attention in the media, policies, industry, NGO's, the wider public and within the scientific community. Microplastics and larger marine debris seem to be present everywhere we look, from our beaches to the deep sea and in the the seafood we eat.

This evening's speakers will provide a solid introduction to the widespread problem of marine litter, its distribution and magnitude, implications for marine ecosystems and human health as well as current initiatives to reduce its impacts.

Project Manager Marine and Maritime Data and Analysis, European Environment Agency: "Tackling marine litter in Europe: the Marine Strategy Framework Directive and the potential of citizen science through Marine LitterWatch + Experiences from a trans-Atlantic expedition with focus on contaminants and plastics in our bodies and our environment."
